



Waiver and Compromise

What is Waiver And Compromise?

It is a program that Child Support Enforcement Agencies (CSEA) may use to reduce or forgive past due child support owed to the **State of Ohio**. Past due support owed to the parent ordered to receive support can't be included in this program.



Parents ordered to pay support can become overwhelmed by the amount of past due support they owe and feel there is no chance for success in paying off this debt. This program may provide them an opportunity to have a portion of the past due support reduced.

What Is The Difference Between A Waiver And A Compromise?

When a parent ordered to pay support has the ability to make regular support payments, a **compromise** may be used to **reduce** the amount of the past due support owed to the State of Ohio. Payments are required to qualify for a compromise.

When a parent has a current order to pay child support, but also has a documented inability to make his/her support payments, a **waiver** may be used to **eliminate** past due support owed to the State of Ohio. Payments are not required to qualify for a waiver.

Does My Case Qualify For Waiver Or Compromise?

Circumstances are unique to each parent ordered to pay support. Contact your local CSEA to see if they offer the program and if you may qualify. All counties are **not** required to offer waiver and compromise.



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How Do I Request A Waiver Or Compromise Of My Past Due Support?

If you are ordered to pay support and would like to make a request for waiver and compromise contact your local CSEA. Your request should be in writing and include supporting documentation to substantiate your claims. The CSEA is permitted to allow only **one** waiver per case. There is **no limit** to the number of compromises that can be made on a case.

What Happens Once I Submit My Request For A Waiver Or Compromise?

The CSEA will review your request and provide you with the results. If the amount of past due support being considered for waiver and compromise is **under** \$5,000, your local CSEA has the authority to approve the request. If the amount of past due support being considered for waiver and compromise is **over** \$5,000, your request will have to be submitted to the State Office of Child Support for approval consideration. You will receive written notification if your request is approved or denied. If your request is denied, the decision is final and you do not have appeal rights. If your request is approved a Court or Administrative Order will be filed to adjust the past due support owed on your case.



Is A Waiver Or Compromise Final?

Yes, unless you fail to comply with the terms and conditions in the Agreed Entry; acted with intent to defraud the CSEA by furnishing false information or concealed assets; or there is a mutual mistake of material fact. If any of these situations occur, the Agreed Entry may be set aside and the past due support may be added back to your case.
